
Portraits of Dutchess County (1680-1807) and 19th Century Art in Dutchess County by S. Velma Pugsley (6x9 inches,44 pages and 47 pages - pamphlets) Published 1976. Two volume compilation of colonial and 19th century paintings relating to Dutchess County. Includes well known artists (Stuart, Copley, West, Durand, Morse, Jarvis, Ammi Phillips) as well as unpublicized examples by lesser known artists in private collections. Black and white photos of each painting with brief biographies of artists and their subjects. **\$8 each.** 



Taconic Pathways: Through Beekman, Union Vale, LaGrange, Washington, and Stanford by Joyce Ghee and Joan Spence (6.5x9.2 inches, 128 pages - paperback) Published 2000 by Arcadia. Photographic history exploring 5 central Dutchess County communities and their relationship to the nearby Taconic State Parkway - once a scenic recreational roadway now also a commuter highway. *\$18.99 plus 8.125% sales tax.* 


**FDR at Home** edited by Nancy Fogel (6x9 inches, 205 pages - paperback) Published 2005 by DCHS. Features in-depth studies of FDR's first foray in politics, his lifelong pursuit of local history, his plans for the first presidential library, and personal recollections of the man in his element. Six decades after his death, this book records with wit and clarity FDR's abiding love for Dutchess County. **\$20.** 







**Transformations of an American County** (8.5x11 inches, 239 pages - paperback) Published 1986 by DCHS. Collection of papers read at a local history conference celebrating Dutchess County's 300th anniversary. Includes 25 papers from historians, genealogists, educators, activists, and scholars on a variety of topics in the fields of political, social, economic, and cultural history. **\$20.** 

**East Fishkill** by Malcolm J. Mills (6.5x9.2 inches, 128 pages - paperback) Published 2006 by Arcadia. Photographic history offering a unique glimpse of East Fishkill before suburban development. Contains vintage photos from the East Fishkill Historical Society, Town Hall archive and personal collections of many residents. *\$19.99 plus 8.125% sales tax.* 






An American Treasure: The Hudson River Valley Photographs by Ted Spiegel, text by Jeffrey Simpson. (8.5x11 inches, 136 pages with pullout map - paperback) Published 1986 by Historic Hudson Valley. Fans of superb local photography will not want to miss this book filled with 139 full color annotated photos of the Hudson Valley's historic places and natural splendor. Includes images of New York City's harbor, Sleepy Hollow Country, the Hudson Highlands, the Great Estates Region, The Capital District and Saratoga, and the North Country. **\$20.**  Harlem Valley Pathways: Through Pawling, Dover, Amenia, North East, and Pine Plains by Joyce Ghee and Joan Spence (6.5x9.2 inches, 126 pages - paperback) Published 1998 by Arcadia. An impressive and unprecedented collection of archival images from 5 towns in the Harlem Valley tracing the growth and development of this region separated from the rest of Dutchess County by mountainous ridges. **\$16.99 plus 8.125% sales tax.** 




Hollow Oak Chronicles: The Van Vliets of Dutchess County edited by Nancy Fogel (6x9 inches, 136 pages - paperback) Published 2005 by DCHS. Follows one Dutchess County family across 300 years using a rich archive of letters, diaries, photographs, and maps. In 7 compelling essays, the Van Vliet family is vividly brought to life - including Helena, who as a young nurse journeys to China during the Chinese Civil War; and Henry and Hannah, whose love is a story of unwavering devotion. *\$15.* 






**Poetry in Dutchess County** edited by Holly Wahlberg (6x9 inches, 203 pages - paperback) Published 2008 by DCHS. Evokes an era when poetry held a surprisingly central place in everyday American life. Includes poems inspired by Dutchess County or written by county residents along with poet biographies and illustrations. *\$15.* 


**Reflections on a River** edited by Holly Wahlberg (6x9 inches, 244 pages - paperback) Published 2009 by DCHS. Collection of 12 essays exploring the Hudson River's role in shaping the history of Dutchess County. Topics include the river's influence on art, architecture, landscape design, education, commerce, tourism, mapmaking, fishing, engineering, sports, land use, and community development. *\$15.* 





In Their Own Words: Telling Dutchess County History edited by Holly Wahlberg (6x9 inches, 213 pages - paperback) Published 2010 by DCHS. 16 oral histories and first person narratives vividly sharing history as experienced by actual participants. Fascinating accounts of the Civil War, Vassar's first graduating classes, ice yachting, great estate life, early medical care, Black history, the Poughkeepsie RR Bridge, newspaper reporting, retailing, ethnic baking, guarding the Roosevelts, meeting John Burroughs, working with Andy Warhol, and more. **\$15**  The Role of Dutchess County During the American Revolution by Beatrice Fredriksen (5.5x8.5 inches, 60 pages - pamphlet) Published 1976. Overview of the role of Dutchess County in the American Revolution. Includes brief biographies of patriot notables and information on Revolutionary War historic sites surviving in Dutchess County. Bibliography and photos. **\$5.** 

**The Rombout Patent** by Henry Cassidy (6x9 inches, 16 pages - pamphlet) Published 1985 by DCHS. Story of how Francis Rombout and Gulian VerPlanck acquired from the Wappingers Indians and the British government 85,000 acres east of the Hudson between New York and Albany in 1685. The Rombout Patent included what is now the City of Beacon, the towns of Fishkill, E. Fishkill and Wappinger, some of LaGrange and a small portion of Poughkeepsie. Includes biographies of Rombout and VerPlanck, photos and transcriptions of colonial era documents. *\$8.*






**New Perspectives on Poughkeepsie's Past** (6x9 inches, 189 pages - paperback) Published 1988 by DCHS. Collection of 7 papers by modern scholars exploring areas not addressed in Edmund Platt's 1905 history of Poughkeepsie. Topics include architectural styles, black history, the history of Poughkeepsie Catholicism, neighborhood development, and urban renewal. **\$15.** 

**History of Poughkeepsie (1683-1905)** by Edmund Platt (8.5x11 inches, 328 pages - hard cover) Published 1987 by DCHS, facsimilie of original 1905 edition. Chronological history of Poughkeepsie from its founding to 1905. Includes index, biographies, photos. Still the most significant and comprehensive text for those interested in Poughkeepsie's history. **\$35.** 





Vassar College by Maryann Bruno and Elizabeth Daniels (6.5x9.2 inches, 128 pages - paperback) Published 2001 by Arcadia. Photographic history of Vassar College prepared by Vassar graduates Maryann Bruno (Associate Director of College Relations) and Elizabeth A. Daniels (Vassar Historian and retired Vassar professor and dean). Includes over 200 photos depicting Vassar's fascinating growth and change since its founding in 1861. *\$19.99 plus* 8.125% sales tax.



Sects, Schisms, and Dissent edited by Roger Donway 191 Pages. Published 2012 by DCHS. The split in the Dutch Reform Church. Dutchess Quakers Sicksite separation. The evolution of Poughkeepsie Jewish community. Impact of American Catholic Parochial education. Articles on the farming life. **\$20**  Catharyna Brett: Portrait of a Colonial Businesswoman by Henry Cassidy (7x9.75 inches, 144 pages - pamphlet) Published 1992 by DCHS. Biography of the legendary "Madam Brett" (1687-1764) - wife, mother, and pioneer entrepreneur who rose to the challenge of life in a colonial Dutchess County wilderness with remarkable skill and success. *\$15.* 

18th Century Documents of the Nine Partners Patent compiled by Clifford Buck and William McDermott (6x9.25 inches, 735 pages - hard cover) Published 1979 by DCHS. Contains actual transcriptions of Proceedings of the Nine Partners (1730-1749), Minutes of Annual Town Meetings (1798-1802), Manumissions of Slaves (1791-1817) and 1801 Tax List. Also contains summaries (but not transcriptions) of over 2,200 deed, mortgage and estate documents. Name and town indexes included. (The Nine Partners Patent included Amenia, Clinton, Hyde Park, Pleasant Valley, Stanford, Washington and part of North East.) **\$45**.

**Marriages and Deaths (1778-1825)** edited and compiled by Helen Wilkinson Reynolds (6.25x9.25, 140 pages - hard cover) Published 1982 by DCHS. Contains marriage and death listings published in newspapers printed at Poughkeepsie from 1778 to 1825. Volume originally printed in 1930. *\$20.* 

**Dutchess Community College: The 50th Anniverary** edited by Keith O'Neill (6x9 inches, 135 pages - paperback) Published 2007 by DCHS. Special edition of the DCHS year book commemorating the 50th anniversary of Dutchess Community College. 12 essays exploring the founding, growth and people of the DCC campus community. *\$15.*

Vassar: The Remarkable Growth of a Man and his College by Edward R. Linner, edited by Elizabeth A. Daniels (6.5x9.2 inches, 210 pages - hard cover) Published in 1984 by Vassar College. Vassar Professor Edward Linner explores the story of the founding of the grand educational experiment called Vassar College. **\$15.** 



**Our Outdoor Heritage** edited by Roger Donway. 244 Pages. Published 2011 by Dutchess County Historical Society. The essays have an emphasis on Hudson Valley outdoor environment. Innis Free Garden, golf in Dutchess County, fox hunting, Blithewood, Sandanona, and Peach Hill. Famous local people Charles Warner 19<sup>th</sup> Century cabinet maker William Woodworth inventor of a planing machine. **\$15**
